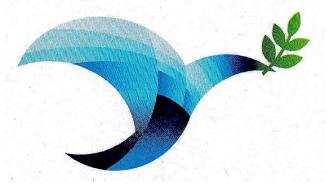

Thoughts From the Pastor, Phil Gulley

Social Recession

In a recent blog, Heather Cox Richardson, observed that when people hear the word "recession," they think in economic terms. But recessions, Richardson noted, can take other forms and spoke of "social recession," when our confidence in social institutions is so depleted our sense of community suffers. Quite simply, our lack of trust in one another cripples our ability to live together. Social scientists who've studied this trend cite the national assassinations of the 1960s, the Vietnam War, Watergate, the abuse scandals of the Roman Catholic Church, the politicization of media, the banking illegalities causing the Great Recession, and the financial and sexual scandals of prominent evangelicals. This social recession didn't happen overnight and won't soon be repaired.

Most of us have borne witness to this social recession, even though we've lacked the ability and awareness to describe it. It's difficult to notice and interpret long-term trends as they occur, but once the problem is defined, we can begin to seek solutions, one of which is our commitment to relearn trust. This is never easy, because we've all been let down and disappointed by institutions and people we once trusted.

My way of combatting social recession is to remain engaged in social institutions. I write and speak about political issues because I'm not willing to ignore that important dimension of our common life. I remain at Fairfield as your pastor because I believe spiritual communities are an integral part of social cohesion and betterment. That's also why I support unions, guilds, bowling leagues, Rotarians, and Little League baseball. I'm for anything that brings people together, with the exception of wars and Justin Bieber concerts.

The only way to correct the collapse of social institutions is to commit ourselves anew to social institutions, which means committing ourselves anew to one another and the communities we form, both large and small. I have a friend so disappointed in American politics he now refuses to vote, which to me is like being so disappointed in marriage you ignore your spouse. In what world is that a viable and reasonable response?

The effects of economic recession are clear—poverty, hunger, illness, and crime. The effects of social recession are equally visible, once we know what to look for—depression, anxiety, mistrust, anger, and loneliness—all of which are at epidemic levels today. I'm not sure what the answer to economic recession is, monetary policy has never been my strong suit. But I know without a doubt the solution to social recession—to join, to belong, to include, to gather, to unite. These are my priorities as your pastor, as one who believes we are not saved so much by Jesus as we are by one another.

The following highlights are from the July 16 Monthly Meeting (MM), be sure to see the final minutes for details:

- Mike Chenoweth presented the June Financial Statement. June was not a good month for two reasons, collections were down as they typically are in June, and it was the end of a quarter when Yearly Meeting assessments are paid. The average weekly offering was \$1,912, lowering the year-to-date average to \$3,515 that is still \$600 more than at the same time last year. Overall, the first six months of 2023 resulted in a \$14,776 budget surplus, and reserves stand at around \$31,000 in excess of our target.
- Ann Tarvin reported for Ministry and Counsel with items that are in the planning stage. Fall hike will be some time in October. A trip to the National Civil Rights Museum is being considered, as well as the Underground Railroad Museum in Cincinnati. End of summer pitch in/picnic will be held August 27 following worship.
- Trustees did not meet in July so there was no report.
- Gan Baker reported for Christian Education. Children's church has been suspended for the summer, and will resume the week after Labor Day. The Halloween party that had been tentatively scheduled for October 29 will be October 22.
- Sue Walton is still seeking help with Books and Brunch, for publicity in particular.
- A minute regarding the Lick Branch cemetery has been compiled by Randy Horton, building on notes written in the past by Phyllis and Frank Gladden. It is important to have this recorded and filed in the archives at Earlham as it explains why those graves now reside in a corner of the Fairfield cemetery.
- Next Monthly Meeting will be August 20.

Plastic Free July (and into August)

Did you know that July was "Plastic-Free July®"? (<u>https://www.plasticfreejuly.org</u>) But it doesn't have to just be July! Let's do our best to make every month plastic-free. By choosing to make small changes, you can make a big difference. Plastic Free July® is a key initiative of the Plastic Free Foundation that works toward a vision of seeing a world free of plastic waste.

Plastic Free July® focuses on single-use plastic which are disposable plastics that are typically used only once before they are thrown away (or recycled). Plastic bags, straws, coffee stirrers, soda and water bottles and most food packaging are all single-use plastics.

The book "How to Give up Plastic," by Will McCallum, states that the Ocean Conservancy has estimated that there is already over 165 million tons of plastic in the ocean; the Ellen MacArthur Foundation, an organization committed to creating a circular economy which is designed to eliminate waste and pollution, estimates that at the rate we are increasing production, plastic could outweigh fish in the ocean by 2050.

Here are some figures to think about:

- 120 billion plastic bottles are made by Coca-Cola every year
- 363 million tons of plastic produced every year
- 13.9 million tons of plastic entering the ocean every year
- 450 years for a plastic bottle to break down in the ocean
- 90% of seabirds have plastic in their stomachs
- 300 billion single-use coffee cups end up as landfill or litter worldwide

By choosing to refuse single-use plastics by switching to durable re-usable items, avoiding packaging and reducing waste, this stops millions of tons of plastic polluting the world each year. By reducing plastic waste, avoiding landfill and litter, we can create cleaner communities and positive impacts, and mitigate the increasing costs of waste management and recycling.

Outreach Committee

The Outreach Committee was given the responsibility of distributing \$10,000.00 from the general fund of Fairfield Meeting. We met in May to discuss the best distribution of these funds. We tried to follow the guidelines that we use in our normal budget distributions - to ensure we had distributions for local, national, and international.

Family Promise - \$1,000.00.

Grace Lunch Fund - \$1,250.00. This money will go to four schools in Spencer-Owen County School Corporation. Three elementary schools will receive \$250.00 each a middle school will receive \$500.00. This money is used to clear negative balances for students' lunch accounts.

Gathering Together Hospice - \$1,000.00. This hospice facility is located in Plainfield. This nonprofit organization does not charge for its services. It operates on contributions only.

Exodus International - \$2,000.00. This donation was made in honor of our beloved Sulaiman family. This organization made it possible for the Sulaimans to relocate to the United States.

RIP Medical Debt - \$1,000.00 This organization helps eliminate medical debt by purchasing it in bundles. This \$1,000.00 donation will eliminate \$100,000.00 debt for families in Indiana.

Mommy & Baby Baskets (organized by Anne Gautier) - \$500.00. Anne will use this money to purchase items needed by moms and babies that she serves in Marion County.

The remaining \$3,250.00 will be disbursed before the end of the calendar year. The members of the Outreach Committee are trying to be open to causes and needs that could benefit from your contributions. Thank you for your generous support of Fairfield Meeting.
