

THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR, PHIL GULLEY

Here's to 2021!!

I'm creeping up on my 60th birthday, which officially marks my entrance into geezerhood. I know I'm supposed to say I don't feel like a geezer, but that would be untrue. I feel like one of those people you read about in the newspaper who just turned 115 and a reporter visited them to take their picture, then asked them the secret to their longevity and all the old person wanted was for everyone to leave them alone so they could watch Wheel of Fortune and take a nap.

The old person's secret to longevity is always the same. They claim never to have smoked, vouch for the benefits of exercise, caution against red meat, then mention they believe in God. I've never smoked a cigarette, end each day with a vigorous two-mile walk, seldom eat red meat, and have been a pastor for 36 years, but the way I feel now I'll be lucky to see 65. If a newspaper reporter wants to ask me the secret to longevity, they better do it soon, while I can still construct a coherent sentence.

I'm not complaining, mind you. I've often felt like an old man trapped in a younger man's body. When I was 10 years-old, my idea of a perfect day was sitting on a bench in front of our town's Rexall and complaining about teenagers. At the age of 12, I saved up my money for a pair of suspenders. So to be 60, to be an official geezer, is a joy beyond compare. I've waited my whole life for this.

Growing up, I was envious of people who'd lived through the Great Depression and World War II, which trumped every catastrophe my generation experienced, except perhaps disco and Captain and Tennille. But having survived 2020, I can now tell young people they don't know the meaning of hardship. I've been practicing what I'll say the next time I hear a kid complain about something.

"You think you got it bad. I remember when there wasn't any toilet paper and you had to drive to the Wal-Mart to use the biffy." (They won't know what a biffy is, so I'll have to explain that, too.)

"You think you got it bad. I remember people touching germy doorknobs and falling over dead." (That never happened, but when complaining about hardship, one shouldn't be constrained by truth.)

The youngster will look at me with newfound respect, marveling at the adversity I've endured.

I'm seven years away from collecting Social Security, but intend to keep working until I die, so I can be that one old guy in the office who disparages every new idea, snorting in contempt at every advancement.

"Electricity? Why when I started working here, we didn't even have electricity. We did everything by hand. We were men back then."

I'm the only person our Quaker meeting employs, so I'll be talking to myself, but geezers do that all the time anyway.

Here's hoping 2021 will be a better year than 2020. It won't take much.

For the past several years, Fairfield has collected donations of hats and gloves at Christmas for the children who attend Patricksburg Elementary School in Owen County IN. Due to pandemic restrictions this year, we had to do it a little differently than usual. Rather than everyone doing their own shopping, we asked for monetary donations so we could order all items in bulk and have only one person doing the sorting.

Thanks to the generosity of our members and attenders, over 120 hats and pairs of gloves as well as a candy cane and a Christmas pencil were delivered to the school by two USFW (Women's Group) members. We also have money left over and are working with the school to decide how best to use it.

Owen County is one of the poorest counties in Indiana with one high school, one middle school and four elementary schools with Patricksburg Elementary being in the poorest area of the county. If you would like to know more about the school, you can Like their FaceBook page.

REPORT ON CULTIVATING GENEROUS CONGREGATIONS

TWO CONGREGATIONS

Which one are we?

Pay-the-Bills

Congregation frames religious giving in mostly unspiritual terms as necessary to keep the doors open and meet the budget.

- Money is scarce.
- We have bills to pay if we are to survive.
- Focus is internal and insular.
- You must do your fair share.

Share-the-Vision

Congregation tends to connect and integrate money and spirituality.

- We may not be rich, but we have more than enough.
- We can dare to dream and grow in faith.
- Focus is external and global.
- Partner and grow in faith with us.

The January 10 presentation will be followed by a written report that will be distributed to everyone in the Meeting. The report will include some proposals for some new ways for Fairfield to do business.
