

# Thoughts From the Pastor, Phil Gulley

#### **Our New Grandson**

You didn't honestly think I was going to let the birth of our new grandson pass without my writing about it, did you? Of course you didn't.

Reports from Alaska are encouraging. Our son Sam reports that Henry Gulley is a good and steady sleeper, not prone to bouts of crying, and eats every four hours on the dot. He's added nine ounces since his birth on August 31st. His father seemed pleased by this, even after I pointed out that at this rate Miles will weigh 307 pounds by his 21st birthday, 614 by the age of 42, and 892 by the time he's my age. Unless, of course, he starts exercising, which thankfully he has done. His mom and dad took him on a 5K walk this past week and he made it the whole way without one complaint.

I don't believe grandchildren are supposed to live in Alaska when their grandparents live in Indiana, so one of us is going to have give in and move. Joan is headed up there on September 27<sup>th</sup> for two weeks. I'm staying home to tend the dog and our granddaughter Madeline, whose father will be busy with the fall harvest. I love Madeline more than life itself, but am at the same time terrified of her, given her habit of asking me to play Barbie with her.

"You be Barbie," she says, handing me a Barbie, "and I'll be Skipper."

Skipper, you'll remember, is Barbie's little sister.

I hand Madeline my phone and ask if her she wouldn't like to have her own Facebook page and Twitter account, but she says no, that she'd rather play "Barbie and Skipper Go to Purdue and Become Veterinarians."

What is it with kids these days?

We FaceTime with Miles nearly every day. He sleeps through most of our calls, waking occasionally to peer around the room and smile at the dog, who is ever-present, never straying from Mile's side. If I had my way, every baby would come with a dog. A child needs to know the blessings of unearned affection and selfless devotion. But then, don't we all.

Sam has eleven years to go before he can retire from the Army, and there's no guarantee they'll return to Indiana to live. So if Miles is to be a part of our lives, it will require frequent airplane trips to Alaska. It would be cheaper and easier to move there, but then we'd never see Madeline. We are a house divided, one piece of our hearts in Alaska, the other in Danville.

A big problem with life is the many directions our affections pull us. We often feel torn between competing desires, wanting it all, even as we realize its impossibility. It would be easier if all our decisions were between an obvious good and an obvious bad, but matters are seldom that clear. Instead, we're pulled between the people and values we most treasure. When my friend Joe was dying, I watched his wife, in determining the way forward, forced to choose between life and death. Each had their blessings, each their struggles. I wish they had classes in school about how to choose.

I want my grandson in Indiana, but his parents love Alaska. Is my happiness more important than theirs? Is theirs more important than mine? Decisions, decisions. For now, it looks like we'll be flying to Alaska several times a year. On the plus side, summers are beautiful in Alaska. And a big chunk of my heart is there, to boot. May God bless his little round tummy.

#### CLERK PLEASE

#### October 2022

The following highlights are from the September 18 Monthly Meeting, be sure to see the final minutes for details:

- For Phil, the month of August was not as productive as most, given his gall bladder removal and subsequent recovery. He is pleased to report feeling much better, and appreciates the well wishes and support of the Meeting during his illness and recovery.
- August was another good month for the treasury, expenses and revenue resulted in a net surplus of around \$5,800 for the month. Average weekly offering for August was up significantly relative to the year to date. Reserve funds reached 93% relative to our target of 75% of last year's expenses.
- Ministry and Counsel sponsored a highly successful ice cream social on the last Sunday in August. Around 200 people from around the country and the world have signed up for the Quakerism classes to be led by Max Carter. Due to the large audience, the committee is paying to expand our Zoom capacity from 100 to 500. In concert with the trustees, USFW, and the library committee, M&C has planned a Fairfield Sale/Books/Brunch for Oct. 15. Singing three hymns sometimes shortens the time available for silence, so the committee is suggesting we have only two hymns for a time, and then reevaluate the number of hymns after hearing comments from attenders.
- Trustees reported that surveyors from Plainfield have been working at the property as plans for the intersection continue in the development stage. Tom Farrington proposed an alternate to the current camera system used for the Zoom broadcast. If successful, it may replace the iPad as it offers more view options. Also, the modem has been moved from the office to the sound booth, thereby enhancing band width. General improvement have been made to landscaping, with tress trimmed, mulch spread beneath many bushes, and planting done along the south face of the building. A sale of items from the 1892 Meeting House will held on October 15. Items will be displayed beneath the entry canopy. A police chase and subsequent car wreck resulted in damage to fencing along Camby Road as well as damage to two headstones. Insurance agencies are working toward resolution of cost involved in repairs.

#### GEORGE MACDONALD

I would rather have a son of mine a carpenter, a watchmaker, a woodcarver, a shoemaker, a jeweler, a blacksmith, a bookbinder, than I would have him earn his bread as a clerk in a counting house. Not merely is the cultivation of operant faculty a better education in faculty, but it brings the man nearer to everything operant; humanity unfolds itself to him the readier; its ways and thoughts and modes of being grow the clearer to both intellect and heart....What advantage the carpenter of Nazareth gathered from his bench, is the inheritance of every workman, in proportion as he does divine, that is, honest work.

We know that time spent in nature does wonders for our physical and mental wellbeing. It can lower anxiety and breathing fresh air has been shown to boost our immune systems. It also reminds us of the miracles of creation we are gifted with on this wonderful planet and inspires us to protect them.

In 1900 fellow Hoosier, Richard Lieber, was just so inspired. After a tour of Yosemite National Park, he came back to Indiana and began a journey that eventually led to creation of the Indiana State Park System.

During Indiana's statehood centennial in 1916, Lieber encouraged Indiana Governor Samuel M. Ralston to start the State Parks Committee, with Lieber as chairman. The committee started acquiring parks, succeeding with McCormick's Creek and Turkey Run both opening on December 11, 1916, without any state funds (The Indianapolis Motor Speedway was a major private donor).

So, join us, if you're able, and enjoy time spent in one of Indiana's great state parks.
